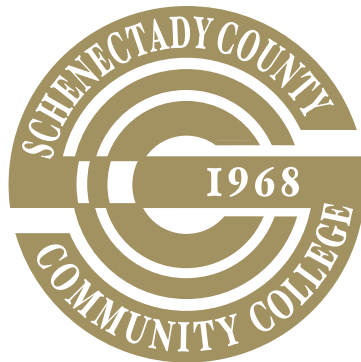

The Schenectady County Community College (SCCC) Board of Trustees passed a resolution appointing Dr. Quintin B. Bullock as President of SCCC at their meeting on December 15, 2008. The State University of New York Board of Trustees confirmed his appointment in January 2009 and he began his duties as the President of the College on July 1, 2009.

Dr. Bullock is a consummate professional, an educator, an exemplary community leader, a mentor, and a positive role model with an extensive, diverse professional background. His career has advanced from an urban high school science teacher, a clinical professional, a community college educator, C/STEP program director, Executive Dean, two Provost positions, and now a community college President.

Dr. Bullock has developed new partnerships with local business and industry, launched new partnerships and collaboration between the community college and public schools, launched and expanded dual enrollment program offerings with local high schools, successfully secured state, federal, and private grant dollars, and led planning and development of new capital projects. Dr. Bullock is a proven and results-oriented executive recognized for his exemplary leadership and for being an ambassador for students, faculty, administrators and the community in which he proudly serves.

A longtime educator, Dr. Bullock has amassed a successful teaching record and has taught as an adjunct professor at Houston Community College in Houston, Texas, Monroe Community College in Rochester, New York, and Tidewater Community College and the Graduate School of Education at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia.

He holds a Doctor of Dental Surgery degree from the University of Texas Health Science Center: Dental Branch in Houston, Texas, and he earned a Master of Education and a Bachelor of Science in Pre-Med from Prairie View A&M University in Prairie View, Texas. In addition, he completed post-doctoral work at the Eastman Dental Center and the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry in Rochester, New York.

Dr. Bullock's leadership training includes the Executive Leadership Institute sponsored by the League for Innovation in the Community College System, the Lakin Institute, the American Association for Community Colleges Future Leaders Program, the Wharton/IRHE Program in Higher Education, the Commonwealth of Virginia Lead Virginia Program, and the Harvard Seminar for New Presidents.

Finally, Dr. Bullock is the recipient of numerous distinguished awards and is very active in college and community programs.

MALINDA MYERS

Malinda Myers was born in West Virginia. She came to Schenectady in 1943. During World War II she was an inspector for Newark, New Jersey Signal Corps Inspection Zone and began this work in Schenectady. Her work in this position ended when the war ended. She then worked in the City of Schenectady's Law Department for 35 years before retiring.

Mrs. Myers has been involved in and integral to many community endeavors and movements. As Chair of the Community College Study Committee in Schenectady in the mid 1960s, Mrs. Myers oversaw a committee of 49 individuals charged with determining the desirability and feasibility of a community college in Schenectady County.

Under her leadership, the Committee conducted research, presented a report to the Schenectady County Board of Supervisors, and the result was Schenectady County Community College.

Prior to this leadership role, Mrs. Myers broke gender lines when in 1959 she was elected as the first female President of the Schenectady NAACP, a position she held for six years. She was a Founding Member of the Schenectady NAACP, Secretary of the Schenectady County Democratic Women's Club, Treasurer of the Schenectady YWCA, Secretary to the Board of Trustees of the Schenectady County Public Library and a Member of the Friends of the Library. In addition, Mrs. Myers was appointed to many environmental groups, including a gubernatorial appointment to the State Parks and Recreation Committee.

Among her many awards, Mrs. Myers was named a Patroon (the highest honor given by the City of Schenectady) by Mayor Karen B. Johnson for her community service, and she was named to the YWCA's Academy of Women of Achievement. She was the first woman to receive the Schenectady Human Rights Commission Award and was honored as one of the 100 Women of Excellence by the Albany-Colonie Regional Chamber of Commerce.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

The United States Flag observed on stage was flown over the United States Capitol in April 2010 at the request of United States Senator Charles E. Schumer, to mark the occasion of the Inauguration of Dr. Quintin B. Bullock as the sixth President of Schenectady County Community College.

HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

Schenectady County Community College was officially established by the Schenectady County Board of Representatives on January 26, 1967, based in part on a study made by a citizens' committee which showed a need for a community college in Schenectady County. In 1968, Governor Rockefeller appointed four Trustees. Following this, the Van Curler Hotel was purchased by the County and designated as the site for the College.

Located on the western edge of the City of Schenectady, the extensively renovated Van Curler Hotel was transformed into a college, and classes began in September 1969. The building was subsequently renamed Elston Hall in honor of Charles W. Elston. Mr. Elston was a member of the original Board of Trustees and served as chairperson of that board for eight years. Elston Hall houses traditional and electronic classrooms, computer, learning and language labs, science and culinary arts laboratories, the Casola Dining Room, the Van Curler Room, the Lally Mohawk Room, meeting rooms, the College Store, a cafeteria and offices.

In 1978, a multi-purpose building was constructed on campus which houses the Begley Library, including Multimedia Services. This building also houses the SCCC Music Department, designed to meet the needs of students in the nationally accredited music programs, and the Carl B. Taylor Community Auditorium, home to musical and theatrical performances and special events.

The campus was further enhanced in 1987 when the Center for Science and Technology (CST) opened. This unique facility contains the College's physics and chemistry laboratories as well as specialized laboratory facilities for circuits, electronics, vacuum science, and computer networking.

A campus development project was completed in 1992. This added a new student center in Elston Hall which includes a cafeteria, the College Store, student lounge, recreational space, biology and geology laboratories and 15 classrooms. The South Wing addition to Elston Hall added four new culinary arts laboratories and an expanded restaurant facility, the Casola Dining Room. An enclosed pedestrian bridge connecting Elston Hall with the CST was also added, providing improved access.

In the Spring of 2000, the new Gateway Building officially opened. The colorful one-story building houses general classrooms, a child care center, the Gateway Montessori Preschool and offices.

Construction was completed in the Fall of 2001 on the Stockade Building, a three-story academic building which houses computer classrooms, traditional classrooms, lecture halls, conference rooms, Workforce Development, offices and specialty programs. The Stockade Building is connected to Elston Hall and the Begley Library through an enclosed walkway in the heart of campus.

An impressive Culinary Arts addition to Elston Hall houses the new Casola Dining Room with a dedicated kitchen, two culinary arts laboratories, a bakery outlet, and a seminar room. New labs for Nanoscale Materials Technology were added to CST.

The College has continued to increase the number of electronic classrooms with Internet access, multimedia teaching stations and student access to computers. On-campus athletic facilities include an all-weather track, a soccer field, a baseball field and a softball field. A portion of the Schenectady County bike-hike trail is located on the campus along the edge of the Mohawk River for use by students and the general public.

Campus enhancements in the Campus Master Plan include expansion into the surrounding downtown Schenectady area, student housing, expansion to the Music/Drama wing of the Begley Building, a walkway across Washington Avenue and improvements to the east parking lot.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

A uniform code for academic costumes was drafted by an intercollegiate commission in 1893 and has since been adopted by a majority of colleges and universities in the United States. Each of three academic degrees-Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctorate-has its own distinctive gown and hood. The gown representing the Bachelor's degree is distinguished by its long, pointed sleeve. The Master's gown has a longer, narrow closed sleeve, extending below the knee; the arm is passed through a slit in the elbow. In contrast, the Doctoral gown is faced with wide velvet bands.

The most colorful and distinctive item of the academic costume is the hood, which passes around the neck and extends down the back. The Doctoral hood is the largest, and the Bachelor's is the smallest. The wearer's field of learning is indicated by the color of the hood.

THE MACE

The mace is the symbol of authority carried by the grand marshal of the academic procession. Originally a club-shaped weapon with an iron ball on the end, carried by knights of the Middle Ages, the mace has gradually gained ceremonial character. Schenectady County Community College's mace bears as its finial a flame symbolizing enlightenment through education. Three statuettes below the flame depict a Mohawk warrior, a Dutch Patroon (both representative of groups deeply embedded in the history of the Schenectady area) and a graduate in academic mortarboard. The College seal is carved in relief three times on the panels below the statuettes. The staff is decorated with a depiction of palm branches, symbolic of academic victory. The mace is carved from basswood covered with a walnut stain. No machinery or sandpaper were used; only steel carving knives, chisels and files.

The College mace was created by Mr. Ernest W. Wagner. The mace was first carried during the College's Commencement in 1972.

THE COLLEGE MEDALLION

The Medallion, to be presented by Denise Murphy McGraw to President Bullock on behalf of the Board of Trustees at Schenectady County Community College, also represents the integrity and responsibility of the presidential office. Cast in silver and measuring 3" in diameter, it is inscribed to the President of Schenectady County Community College.
