Playwright to premiere work at SCCC

According to Kevin Dobies, "I began writing in the first grade. Back then I wrote about dinosaurs. Now I write about people. Little else has changed."

Dobies '05 will premiere his latest play *Hey Florida!* at SCCC on Thursday, Nov. 17 at 8 p.m. Performances will also take place on Friday, Nov. 18, at 2:15 and 8 p.m., and Saturday, Nov. 19, at 8 p.m. in the Carl B. Taylor Community Auditorium, Begley Building.

He describes the play as a romantic, spiritual and political comedy. Tickets for the SCCC Players production are \$3 for seniors and students, and \$5

general public. The play is free to the SCCC community.

Before *Hey Florida!* Dobies wrote a script about firemen titled *Pyrosexual Enclave* and a handful of one-act plays. Another script, about struggling musicians, is also in the works, as well as a novel. Besides writing, Kevin also acts and directs. He directed Eric Bogosian's *Bitter Sauce* for Albany Civic Theater's Director's Showcase 2004, and has directed staged readings of his own work at SCCC. He is currently studying English at SUNYAlbany.

SCCC Science students and faculty will be celebrities this year as they wave to the crowd during Schenectady's annual Holiday Parade.

Members of the SCCC Science Club will be marching in the parade, a Schenectady tradition for 36 years. The parade kicks off at 7 p.m. at the corner of State Street and Lafayette Street, proceeds west on State to Erie Boulevard, and then heads south on Erie to the 1-890 interchange.

More than 150 groups are scheduled to march in the parade which this year will celebrate Proctor's Theatre and is sponsored by the *Daily Gazette*. The grand marshal will be Col. Max Della Pia, Base Commander of the 109th Airlift Wing of the Stratton Air National Guard base. The parade will close with a fireworks show sponsored by Price Chopper.

United Way campaign begins in November

SCCC's component of the campaign for the United Way of Schenectady County begins this month and extends to December. The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program is one example of the results oriented programs offered by the United Way.

United Way Strategy: Partnership with Build Your Money Coalition (BY\$C), Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program.

Program Results: In its first year, the VITA initiative more than doubled the number of tax returns completed free for low income County residents, and brought in a total of \$468,380 for those eligible to receive the earned income tax credit and additional credits for such items as children and education.

Intended Long-Term Impact: Improve the health and well-being of all people in our community by promoting programs that help lift families out of poverty and provide economic opportunities.

Shirley* is a single mother and employee of a large retail store. She had trouble meeting her increased heating bills and making sure her children were dressed warmly in winter clothes that would fit their quickly growing bodies. She saw commercials on television for a place that would prepare her tax return and give her an immediate loan on the refund. Even though she knew their fees would take a good portion of her refund, she had extra winter bills that needed to be paid.

Shirley heard about the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program and her counselor at SCAP explained that her refund would arrive within about two weeks and no fees would be charged. She decided to try the program. Her volunteer tax preparer explained that she was eligible for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and other credits she had not claimed in the past. Shirley was delighted when her refund arrived less than two weeks later and for a larger amount than she had ever received. She proudly told United Way, "Now I will be able to pay my extra bills with that."

Honors courses offer rewarding study

Do you have a passion for literature or history? Then SCCC's Honors courses might be for you.

Hon 124-Honors English is an intensive course that concentrates on an incisive study of the short story, the novel, drama, and poetry. This year's theme for the course is "Love Hurts: Bachelors and Spinsters, Marriage and Divorce." Students will be reading a variety of authors from Chaucer and Shakespeare to Edith Wharton and John Updike. Students may take this course in place of ENG 124.

HON 144-The Shaping of the Modern World is designed for students with a strong interest in history and a desire to experience a challenging and rewarding semester in a small class seminar setting. This course is accepted as a substitute for HIS 127, Western Civilization Since 1715. It counts, as well, as either a humanities or social science elective in any program.

In addition to a general survey of modern world history since the middle of the 17th century, with more exposure to the non-western world than is provided in Western Civilization, Shaping of the Modern World allows each student to select a theme of personal interest that is applicable to the time period for focused study with guidance from the instructor. Themes have included military history, music, painting, the history of science, women's history, area studies and many others. The readings for this semester include Isaiah Berli's famous essay on history, *The Hedgehog and the Fox*, Thomas Mann's *The Magic Mountain*, Crane Brinton's *Anatomy of Revolution*, and Jonathan Spence's *The Chan's Great Continent*.
