Hero of *Hotel Rwanda* to speak at SCCC

Ten years ago, as the country of Rwanda descended into madness, one man made a promise to protect



the family he loved, and ended up finding the courage to save over 1,200 people. Over the course of 100 days, almost 1 million people were killed in Rwanda. *Hotel Rwanda*, nominated for three Academy Awards, tells the

inspiring story of real-life hero Paul Rusesabagina, who is portrayed in the film by Don Cheadle, a hotel manager in Rwanda who used his courage to shelter over a thousand refugees from certain death. Rusesabagina will speak at SCCC on Monday, Feb. 13, at 7:30 p.m., in the Carl B. Taylor Community Auditorium. His presentation is free. Seating is limited. The film *Hotel Rwanda* (2004) will be shown on Friday, Feb. 10, and Monday, Feb. 13, from 2 to 4 p.m. in the Stockade Building, Room 101.

Foundation to receive largest gift in College's history: \$1 million bequest from Helen Begley

The SCCC Foundation recently announced a bequest from Helen Begley of \$1 million, the largest gift in SCCC's history. Begley was the widow of Owen M. Begley, who was instrumental in the conversion of the former Hotel Van Curler into SCCC. He was subsequently appointed to the first College Board of Trustees and served as its first chair. Mrs. Begley had resided in Schenectady until her death in February 2005. The gift will go to the Foundation's endowment, which can be used to support student scholarships, new program development and extraordinary college needs.

Owen Begley practiced law in Schenectady for more than 50 years. He served as Mayor of Schenectady from 1949 to 1952, and was elected to the New York State Senate from the 38th District and served there from 1958 to 1965. When the College's second building was completed in 1978, the library in that building was named in honor of Begley in recognition of his dedication and significant contributions to the successful establishment and future promise of the College.

The SCCC Foundation is the fundraising arm of the College and is made up of business, community, and alumni volunteers who solicit funds to provide support for scholarships and other projects that are not possible through the regular college budget.

According to Lois Smith-Law, SCCC Foundation President, "This

extraordinary bequest is the largest gift ever received by the Foundation and will provide opportunities as we continue our mission to help students succeed."

Susan E. Savage, Chair of the Schenectady County Legislature, added "Mrs. Begley's bequest of \$1 million to the Community College is a tremendous demonstration of the long standing commitment of the Begley family to the Community

College and to the community at large. The Schenectady community owes the Begley family a tremendous debt of gratitude."

Vince M. DiCerbo, County Legislator and College Trustee noted, "As a graduate of the College, I'm proud that its become such an integral part of the

community and that people are willing to make such large donations to ensure its success. As a member of the County Legislature, I think the support from the Begley family and members of the community who have aided the College over the years impresses upon the legislators the wide and deep support the college enjoys."

Another exciting development for the Foundation is its ability to provide new estate planning options for donors. SCCC has entered into an agreement with The Research Foundation of SUNY to provide planned gift administration and charitable planning strategies, including Charitable Gift Annuities for life income gifts for alumni and friends of the College.

The (ICC) develops the codes used to construct residential and commercial buildings, including homes and schools. Most U.S. cities, counties and states that adopt codes choose the international codes developed by the International Code Council.



Previous positions and experiences include: Deputy Secretary of State; Director/Deputy Director of Legislative Affairs, Office of the Governor; and Executive/Special Assistant to the Superintendent of the NYS Insurance Department. She has served on the International Code Council Board of Directors; the Board of the National Conference of States on Building Codes and Standards; the Loss Reduction Partnership Committee; and she is a founding member of the Business Network of Emergency Resources, Inc. She resides in Niskayuna.

Know the Score (KTS) is an interactive problem gambling awareness program that engages college and university students in a fun and informative way.

The program will make its United States debut on the SCCC campus Monday, Feb. 13 through Thursday, February 16, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Student Center, Elston Hall. The *Know the Score* booth will also be open Monday, Feb. 13 and Wednesday, Feb. 16 from 4 to 6 p.m. in the Student Center.

Know the Score dispels some common myths regarding randomness, shares signs of problem gambling, tells students where they can get help with gambling-related problems and suggests ways to limit their risks. The KTS program is delivered on college and university campuses using a straightforward strategy with information, a trained contingent of students and a highly visible display.

- The Frances Perkins Program at Mount Holyoke College and the Ada Comstock Scholarship at Smith College are specially

SCCC and HVCC partner on paramedic-EMT course

Local firefighters and paramedics are benefiting from a new partnership between Schenectady County Community College and Hudson Valley Community College.

The community colleges are joining together to offer videoconferencing of Hudson Valley's Paramedic-EMT classes at the Schenectady college's campus.

This venture benefits Hudson Valley Paramedic-EMT students who might live in the western part of the Capital District and find it difficult to travel to Troy each day.

"We have a significant population of students who come from the Amsterdam or Gloversville area and we figure this will save them about three hours of driving each week," Hudson Valley Paramedic Program Coordinator Greg Chapman said. "It seems like a natural that we would link with SCCC because of their Fire Science program."

Administrators at both colleges have been searching for a way to complement each other's efforts. The videoconferencing is possible because both schools have state-of-the-art videoconferencing technology.

"This is an effort between two community colleges to rise above competition to work toward the betterment of our community and our first responders. We want to reach out to partners in the community in a cost-effective way, but not duplicate programs. By working together, we are offering the right training in our community and also saving taxpayers money," said Dr. David

Hennessy, Chair of the SCCC Business and Law Department.

The Paramedic students will still come to the Hudson Valley campus for hands-on courses and attended clinical rounds at a local hospital, Chapman said.

Firefighters from local battalions including those in Schenectady, Niskayuna, Amsterdam, Scotia and Gloversville, have taken advantage of the venture, first offered at both colleges in Fall 2005.

Richard DePasquale, Chief and Training Officer with the City of Amsterdam Fire Department, brought the two institutions together after his department was looking for a site for videoconferencing. He has served as an Adjunct Faculty Member at SCCC, developing the National Incident Management Safety course on the campus, along with Dr. Hennessy.

The Hudson Valley Paramedic program has been using interactive videoconferencing to reach students in outlying regions for about five years. Previous linkages have sent the coursework to Glens Falls and Rutland, Vt.

Chapman said the two schools are also talking about receiving some of SCCC's Fire Science courses at the Troy campus to accommodate students in Rensselaer County interested in that program.

SCCC has offered a Fire Protection Technology A.A.S. degree program since the mid-1970s. It is the only program of its kind in the Capital Region. Hudson Valley has offered a Paramedic-EMT certificate program since 1988.

Nontraditional careers could offer many things, including: interesting and rewarding employment, higher wages and better benefits, opportunities for advancement, and increased job satisfaction.
