ABA reapproves Paralegal degree program

The American Bar Association (ABA) recently reapproved SCCC's Paralegal A.A.S. degree program for another seven years (2005-2012). The reapproval comes as a result of the College's success in meeting rigorous quality standards set by the ABA. The SCCC Paralegal degree program is the only ABA approved program in the Capital Region.

The requirements for reapproval include a review of current texts, faculty course content and exams, internships provided, student evaluations, classroom observations, faculty evaluations, graduate surveys, employer surveys, recruitment and job placement records, student audits, advisory meetings, department meetings, budget analysis and library resources.

In October 2005, representatives from the ABA Approval Commission, made a two-day site visit to SCCC, conducting a thorough review of the program. During the visit, the site team met with Business and Law Department Chair Dr. David Hennessy, full- and part-time faculty members, support staff, students, alumni and administrators. ABA representatives prepared a final report which recommended to the Commission that the program be reapproved, stating in their final report, "the program continues to offer excellent educational opportunities for paralegals."

According to Dr. Hennessy, "ABA approval demonstrates SCCC's commitment to providing the highest quality educational programming at an affordable cost. Our superb faculty prepare our students for this vital work in our community. To have ABA approval is a tribute to the hard work of our faculty and students."

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Faculty/Staff Development

Dr. Jillmarie Murphy, Associate Professor in the Developmental Studies Department, presented a paper at the Northeast Modern Language Association (NEMLA) Conference held in Philadelphia, Pa., March 1-5. Her paper was titled, *Howls and curses, groans and shrieks: Alcoholism and Life's Foreclosed Possibilities in Stephen Crane's Maggie: A Girl of the Streets*.

Dr. Murphy had a paper accepted for presentation at a conference this June. *Chester, Grace, and Dreiser: The Birth of An American Tragedy* is an interdisciplinary conference marking the centennial anniversary of the famous 1906 trial of Chester Gillette, the resident of Cortland, N.Y., who was convicted of and executed for the murder of his pregnant girlfriend, Grace Brown of South Otselic, N.Y. The trial attracted national media attention, and its story inspired Theodore Dreiser's renowned novel *An American Tragedy*, which in turn inspired the classic film *A Place in the Sun*. Dr. Murphy's presentation is titled, *A small and routed army: Clyde Griffiths and the Trauma of Religious Addiction in Theodore Dreiser's An American Tragedy*.

Frances Loeffler, Professor and Chair of the Developmental Studies Department, participated in the 43rd Annual International Conference of the Learning Disabilities Association of America from Feb. 26 to March 1 in Jacksonville, Fla. Presentations covered the latest research, techniques, and best practices for children and adults with learning disabilities. In addition, there were workshops on post secondary transition and student support.

Rocco Verrigni, Professor in the Hotel, Culinary Arts and Tourism Department, was a presenter at the Northeast Health Diabetes Center's *Diabetes Makeover: Strategies for Taking Charge of Your Diabetes* held at the Turf Inn in Albany on March 4.

Professor Verrigni's presentation was titled *Healthy Cooking Techniques: Preservation of Flavor*. The presentation included a discussion, a cooking demonstration and a tasting of recipes illustrating healthy cooking techniques.

Professor Robert Hoff, of the Business and Law Department, attended the 43rd Annual Meeting of the American Criminal Justice Society (ACJS) in Baltimore, Md., from Feb. 28 through March 4. The title of the conference was *Investing in Quality: The Philosophy and Practice of Assessment in Criminal Justice*.

During the ACJS conference **Dr. David Hennessy**, Associate Professor and Chair of the Business and Law Department, participated in a panel discussion titled "Chairing a Criminal Justice Department at the Community College Level: Issues and Challenges" with colleagues from Onondaga Community College, Mercer Community College, Wayne Community College and Virginia Commonwealth University.

Most of the scholarships are for students returning for the Fall 2006 semester, but two are for graduating or transferring students.

A native North Carolinian, Dr. Johnson was educated in Illinois, receiving her Ph.D. in American Literature and History from the University of Illinois in Urbana. For 23 years she was a Professor at the University of Alabama where she had a reputation as a faculty activist and where, for 12 years, she served as Chair of the Department of English. She is the author of 19 scholarly books on a wide variety of subjects, chiefly in the areas of American literature, American colonial history, social history, and nineteenth-century theatre history. She has written two studies of Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird*, *Threatening Boundaries* (a Twayne book) and *Understanding To Kill a Mockingbird* with Greenwood-Heinemann Press.

Historically Speaking-How do you spell Schenectady?

Schenectady or Skenectada is the only city in the world with this name. It is a Mohawk Indian word for “Beyond the Pine Plains,” a reference to the sandy Pine Barrens (Pine Bush) that lies between Schenectady and Albany. Originally, Skenectada was used to describe Albany (Fort Orange) before Arent Van Curler and company settled our present area in 1661 and adopted the name. There are close to 100 different spellings of Schenectady found in Dutch documents, old deeds, and publications. Schenectady is known worldwide, mostly due to the contributions of General Electric, Westinghouse, and

American Locomotive, which earned the city the slogan, “The city that lights and hauls the world.” You would be surprised how well-known the name really is.

It has been said that an anthropologist visiting an Alaskan Inuit tribe during the 1940s was trying to explain where he was from to the natives. After much frustration he threw up his hands and shouted “Schenectady!” At that moment the entire tribe broke out in applause and laughter. The startled anthropologist was brought into an igloo where the leader pointed to a radio with “Schenectady, N.Y.,” in raised letters, along the front of it. He finally made contact.
