Applications for 2005 scholarships still available

All SCCC students are strongly encouraged to check out the scholarships available for 2005 by picking up a scholarship application available in the Financial Aid Office (Elston Hall, Room 221) and at the Begley Library Circulation Desk. The application deadline is this Friday, April 1, 2005. Recipients will be announced at the College's Annual Honors Convocation on Tuesday, May 3.

This year 45 different scholarships and awards appear on the application, several of which will have more than one recipient, for a total of 70 scholarships. Although some of the scholarships require financial need, 27 scholarships are based on merit not financial need. The majority of the scholarships are for full-time students, but some of them are also for part-time students. Most of the scholarships are for students returning in the Fall 2005 semester, but two are for graduating or transferring students.

Information is also available about the Broughton Fellowship, the largest award given to an SCCC student. The recipient will receive full tuition, fees and an allowance for books (\$3,758) paid in full for the 2005-2006 academic year. The criteria are: full-time matriculated student; United States citizen; high school graduate; and a student who is graduating from SCCC in May 2006, with a grade point average of between 3.2 and 4.0 who exhibits strong moral character and a commitment to excellence.

There is also information included about the Second Chance Scholarships which will range in amount from \$1,000 to \$3,000 per year for the recipients.

Another scholarship- Outside of the Student Development Center, Elston Hall, Room 223, there is a flyer with details about a scholarship offered to second-year female students age 22 and above currently enrolled in a community college who have maintained a grade point average of 3.5 or above. This \$1,500 grant is to be used by a student entering undergraduate study at an accredited four-year college in the United States. There is no application. Deadline for this scholarship is this Friday, April 1.

Shirlee has been published in journals and anthologies, and says that poetry "both drives her crazy and keeps her sane."

Susan Jeffs, TRIO Counselor, will be reading several poems on themes ranging from sense

of place and discovery to observations about nature and rural life. Some of her poems will be accompanied by live flute music performed by musician Margaret LaFrance. Susan has been a practicing poet for six years and has been published in several nationally distributed journals including *Parnassus*, *Byline* and *Big City Lit*. She is also studying to become a certified Poetry Therapist through the Wordsworth Center in Washington, D.C., and runs groups throughout the community at such places as Saratoga Hospital, Stillpoint Retreat Center and the Saratoga County Arts Council.

Sharon Stenson, an Adjunct Faculty Member who teaches English, is also a local poet, playwright and musician.

All current financial aid awards expire in May, 2005. If you have not yet applied for 2005-2006 financial aid (Summer 2005, Fall 2005, Spring 2006), now is the time to apply. The Financial Aid Office recommends that students apply as soon as their 2004 tax returns are complete. Early applicants will receive the first consideration for financial aid grants, scholarships and work study.

The Financial Aid Office is advising all applicants to complete the Free Application for Federal Financial Aid (FAFSA)

over the Internet at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Students can apply for 2005-2006 Federal Financial Aid and TAP in the same on-line session. It is easy and fast. A brochure with easy Internet instructions is available in the Financial Aid Office, Elston Hall, Room 221.

If students prefer to use the paper FAFSA application, they are also now available in the Financial Aid Office.

Meeting a person who is deaf or hard of hearing

To gain a deaf person's attention, tap him or her on the shoulder or wave a hand to gain visual contact. Look directly at the person while speaking, standing directly in front of the individual if possible. Do not obscure your mouth, the person may be trying to read your lips. Speak directly to the deaf person, not the interpreter. Be aware of body language and facial expressions that may help you in getting your message across. Use written language if needed.

Some people who are deaf choose to speak. If you are unable to understand, ask the person to repeat himself or herself or to write it down.

When two people are using sign language, do not be disrespectful and walk between them. This would be like interrupting their conversation by blocking the view of one another. If you know sign language, attempt to use it, your attempt will be welcome.

Free parenting classes offered through Schenectady YWCA

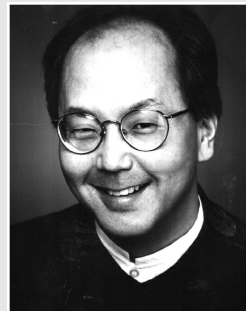

Renowned pianist to perform

SCCC welcomes Guest Artist John Kamitsuka for two performances. On Tuesday, March 29, at 11:30 a.m. Kamitsuka will deliver a lecture and recital at SCCC in the Begley Building, Room 160. On Wednesday, March 30 at 7:30 p.m. in the Carl B. Taylor Community Auditorium, he will perform with pianists Mark Evans, an Adjunct Faculty Member in the SCCC Music Department, and Michele Buselli, during an exciting performance featuring works for two, four and six hands. This concert will feature Brahms's *Variations and Fugue on a Theme of Handel*; Mozart's *Sonata in D Major for Two Pianos* and Rachmaninoff's *Waltz and Romance* for six hands and two pianos. Both performances are free and the public is encouraged to attend.



Kamitsuka performs regularly throughout the United States, South America, Europe and Japan. He has played at prominent New York City venues such as Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall, the 92nd Street Y and Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall. Allan Kozinn of *The New York Times* described John Kamitsuka's June 2004 all J.S. Bach recital at Weill Hall at Carnegie Hall by saying, "...Mr. Kamitsuka's Bach has qualities in common with Gould's....But there are finer aspects to his Bach playing as well, most notably a laser-like focus that kept every strand of counterpoint clear, clean and independent. Strikingly, he used no pedal at all, creating a variety of articulation and color-crisp staccato..." Kamitsuka first performed this Bach program at SCCC while he was Artist-in-Residence in March 2004.

Student shares culture with others

On March 8, Mathematics and Science major and Algonquin descendant Claire Stawski shared Native American culture and music with the SCCC community.
