Applications for 2005 scholarships available

All SCCC students are strongly encouraged to check out the scholarships available for 2005 by picking up a scholarship application available in the Financial Aid Office (Elston Hall, Room 221) and at the Begley Library Circulation Desk. The application deadline is Friday, April 1, 2005. Recipients will be announced at the College's Annual Honors Convocation on Thursday, May 12.

This year 45 different scholarships and awards appear on the application, several of which will have more than one recipient, for a total of 70 scholarships. Although some of the scholarships require financial need, 27 scholarships are based on merit not financial need. The majority of the scholarships are for full-time students, but some of them are also for part-time students. Most of the scholarships are for students returning in the Fall 2005 semester, but two are for graduating or transferring students.

Information is also available about the Broughton Fellowship, the largest award given to an SCCC student. The recipient will receive full tuition, fees and an allowance for books (\$3,758) paid in full for the 2005-2006 academic year. The criteria are: full-time matriculated student; United States citizen; high school graduate; and a student who is graduating from SCCC in May 2006, with a grade point average of between 3.2 and 4.0 who exhibits strong moral character and a commitment to excellence.

There is also information included about the Second Chance Scholarships which will range in amount from \$1,000 to \$3,000 per year for the recipients.

Another scholarship- Outside of the Student Development Center, Elston Hall, Room 223, there is a flyer with details about a scholarship offered to second-year female students age 22 and above currently enrolled in a community college who have maintained a grade point average of 3.5 or above. This \$1,500 grant is to be used by a student entering undergraduate study at an accredited four-year college in the United States. There is no application. Deadline for this scholarship is Friday, April 1.

SCCC student hits the books while at the South Pole

The odds are that you won't meet many people in the course of a day who can say that they have actually touched the South Pole. You will probably meet even fewer who can say that they have been to the South Pole and been a student at SCCC at the same time.

But if you bump into Computer Science major Justin Taylor of Schenectady in the hallways you will have beaten those odds. Last month Justin was deployed on a mission to Antarctica as a member of the Air National Guard, stationed at Stratton Air National Guard base in Glenville.

Members of the guard are responsible for airlift missions to the frigid area to bring supplies to scientists and researchers at the National Science Foundation (NSF) base there. For the trek to this remote area, Justin packed plenty of warm clothes, as well as his laptop computer. During his free time he managed to keep up with the Computer Science and Psychology classes he was taking at SCCC and hasn't skipped a beat in his pursuit of an A.S. degree in Computer Science. "Before I left I got as much of the assignments as I could. I stayed in correspondence with Professor Grossman right along," Justin said. He is currently

taking CIS 134, C++/UNIX with Professor Christine Grossman, as well classes in Visual Basic and Psychology.

He admits that he did get a few strange looks from his colleagues during his recent deployment in Antarctica, as he tried to complete homework assignments in between cargo deliveries to the NSF Center on Antarctica from McMurdo Station where guard members stay. But he knew he would be deployed at some point in the semester so he prepared for his third trip to the South Pole by contacting professors and logging in whenever he could. Guard members prepare for the mission itself by completing combat, water and arctic survival school. During the rigorous training, Justin explained that he lived on an ice cap in Greenland for three days and needed to learn immediately how to deal with the conditions.

The Air Force Flight Engineer said that he will continue to balance being an SCCC student with his work as a member of the Air National Guard, even if that means another deployment to the South Pole. He eventually plans to transfer to SUNY Albany to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Computer Science.

Students: The time is now to apply for Financial Aid

All current financial aid awards expire in May, 2005. If you have not yet applied for 2005-2006 financial aid (Summer 2005, Fall 2005, Spring 2006), now is the time to apply. The Financial Aid Office recommends that students apply as soon as their 2004 tax returns are complete. Early applicants will receive the first consideration for financial aid grants, scholarships and work study.

The Financial Aid Office is advising all applicants to complete the Free Application for Federal Financial Aid (FAFSA)

over the Internet at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Students can apply for 2005-2006 Federal Financial Aid and TAP in the same on-line session. It is easy and fast. A brochure with easy internet instructions is available in the Financial Aid Office, Elston Hall, Room 221.

If students prefer to use the paper FAFSA application, they are also now available in the Financial Aid Office.

Disability Awareness: Meeting a person who uses a wheelchair

Be aware of physical barriers that may block access for a person who uses a wheelchair. Small steps, width of door openings and furniture in the room may block and prevent passage for a person using a wheelchair. No one is "confined to a wheelchair." People who use a wheelchair use words like "run" and "walk." Do not feel that you should not use these words when conversing with a person who uses a

wheelchair.

When talking to a person in a wheelchair for an extended period of time, it would be better to sit at his or her eye level to avoid discomfort for that person having to look up toward you. Treat the person's wheelchair as part of his or her body and refrain from leaning on it. Touching the wheelchair without permission may not be appreciated.

FSA offers funding opportunities

The Faculty-Student Association (FSA) Board of Directors will be accepting requests for funding proposals for the fiscal year which runs June 1, 2005, through May 31, 2006. Funding will be available for use after June 1, 2005, with an ending date of May 31, 2006.

To be eligible for funding, completed funding proposal applications must be submitted to the FSACHairperson, Dean of Administration Patricia Godlewski, Elston Hall, Room 502, by 4:30 p.m. on Friday, March 18. Incomplete applications will not be reviewed. Funding proposals must state how the College community will be benefitted and must be directly related to the FSA's by-laws. The request can come from any member of the College Community and must be submitted through the appropriate Dean or College Official. Proposals should represent a "one-time only" request per fiscal year. The purpose of the FSA is "to supplement, promote, cultivate, advance and enrich those educational, research, social, cultural, athletic, recreational...activities and services...for the students, faculty and administration of SCCC."

Disability Awareness: Meeting a person who is blind

Being legally blind includes both individuals who are totally blind and those who have vision limitations. If a person who is blind appears to need help, identify yourself so the person knows you are there (by a light touch on their arm). Do not be afraid to use words like "see" and "look." People who are blind use these words in everyday conversations because there are simply no other words that can be substituted.

Not all blind people use a walking cane, a guide dog, or are able to read Braille.

Be prepared to help a person who is blind read signs or to give directions. When giving directions, avoid terms such

as "turn this way" or "turn over there."

To lead a person who is blind, allow the person who is blind to take your arm and follow the motion of your body. Tell him or her when a curb, stairs, etc. are going to be navigated. When assisting the individual to a chair, offer to place his or her hand on the chair so he or she will be able to take a seat on his or her own.

If a person who is blind is using a guide dog, remember that the dog is working and that it should not be distracted. The dog is responsible for the master's safety. Do not pet or feed the dog unless you have first asked permission from the dog's master.
